## Methodology

A 35-question, online survey was created by The Outcomes Project to gain information from Martha's Vineyard high school parents about their actions and opinions regarding underage alcohol and other drug use. This survey was administered on December 19<sup>th</sup>, 2009 and closed on March 9<sup>th</sup>, 2010. It was advertised through the local newspaper, on Edline, facebook, and e-mailed to parents on the Youth Task Force (YTF)'s mailing list.

An incentive was given for completion of this survey. When parents completed the survey, they were instructed to email their contact information to the YTF in order to be entered in a raffle drawing for a \$50.00 gift certificate to a restaurant of their choice.

## Sample

There are approximately 750 parents of high school students in Martha's Vineyard. The final sample of 217 survey respondents generates a return rate of 29%. However, many respondents did not complete the entire survey; they either did not finish the survey or skipped questions throughout. The total number of completed surveys was 171. Percentages given throughout the report are of those that answered the question.

Those who stated they were the parent of "None of the above" when given the options for grades in high school (9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>) were removed from the final sample and analysis, as this survey was only intended for parents of high school students. Twenty-five surveys were removed for this reason.

# **Findings**

# Supervision and Talking to Child

# Supervision of Teens

Parents were asked questions regarding knowing where their teen is when they are not home and knowing when they come home. They were asked their perceptions of most Martha's Vineyard's parents' knowledge of their teen's whereabouts as well. The results are illustrated in Table 2.

#### Discussion with Child

Parents were asked how often they have talked with their teenager regarding not using alcohol or other drugs during the past 30 days and what they said. They were also asked how often they believe most Martha's Vineyard parents have talked to their teenager regarding not using alcohol or other drugs. Results are shown in Chart 1 as 'Actual' V. 'Perceived'. In addition, parents were asked what type of discussion they had with their teenager. These results are shown in Table 3.

Chart 1. Frequency of Conversation With Teen in Past 30 Days Regarding Not Using Alcohol or Other Drugs: Actual V. Perceived



# **Beliefs**

#### Parental Influence

Parents were asked how much influence they believe they or their behaviors have over their teen's decision whether or not to drink alcohol. They were also asked how much influence most Martha's Vineyard parents believe they or their behaviors have over their teen's decision whether or not to drink alcohol. Results are illustrated in Table 4.

#### Parental Beliefs

Parents were asked how much they agreed with statements regarding alcohol use on Martha's Vineyard. Those who marked 'strongly agree' and 'agree' are combined as well as those who marked 'strongly disagree' and 'disagree'. Results are shown in Table 5.

#### Perception of Parental Beliefs

Parents were asked how much they believe the <u>typical Martha's Vineyard parent</u> agreed with statements regarding alcohol use on Martha's Vineyard. Those who marked 'strongly agree' and 'agree' are combined as well as those who marked 'strongly disagree' and 'disagree'. Results are shown in Table 6.

# Knowledge and of Current Massachusetts Laws Regarding Youth and Alcohol

Parents were given a lists of statements and asked which were current laws in Massachusetts. Those that marked 'true' are shown in Table 7.

#### Youth Access to Substances

Parents were asked to indicate their level of agreement regarding ease of access for alcohol, marijuana and prescription drugs among youth on Martha's Vineyard.

#### Perception of Alcohol Access Points

Parents were asked if Martha's Vineyard High School students wanted to drink alcohol, where they could get it from most easily. Results are shown in Table 10, in rank order.

#### Prescription Drug Disposal

Parents were asked how they dispose of unused prescription medications.

#### Parental Permission to Drink Alcohol

#### Allowance to Drink Alcohol in Home

Parents were asked how likely they were to allow their teen and their friends to drink alcohol in their home. A range was given where 1 was 'not at all likely' and 5 was 'very likely'. This same question was also asked regarding parent's perception of other parent's allowing their teen and friends to drink in their home. Those who marked '1' and '2' were grouped together in a category named 'Unlikely' and those who marked '4' and' 5' were grouped together in a category named 'Likely'. Results are shown in Table 13.

Parents were asked if they provide alcohol to their own high school aged children and their friends to drink in their home in the past year. The results are reported below.

- ➤ 98% (n=146) of parents stated that they <u>have not</u> allowed their high school student to drink alcohol in their home (excluding for religious purposes).
  - 2% (n=3) of parents stated they have provided alcohol to their own high school student.
- ➤ 99% (n=150) of parents stated they <u>have not</u> provided alcohol to other high school aged children
  - One parent stated they have provided alcohol to other high school aged children.


A separate question asked if parents allowed their high school student to drink in their home with them or other adults, even if it is just a small glass of wine or beer with dinner (not including for religious purposes.

- ➤ No parents indicated that they have allowed their child to drink alcohol in their home regularly; however 15 parents indicated they have occasionally.
- ≥ 90% (n=151) of parents said they never allowed their child to drink in their home.

#### Perception of Martha's Vineyard Parents Provision of Alcohol to Minors

Parents were asked in their opinion, in the past year, what percentage of Martha's Vineyard High School parents have provided alcohol to their own child and what percentage have provided alcohol to other high school students (other than their own child). Results are shown in Chart 2.

#### Purchasing Alcohol for Minor

Parents were asked if they would be willing to purchase alcohol for a person under the age of 21 who is not their own child if they were asked.


- > 151 said 'no'

# Perception of Substance Use

#### Perception of Child's Use


Parents were asked if they believe their high school student has used the following drugs in the past 30 days. The results are shown in Chart 3. Actual MVHS student alcohol and drug use rates within the past 30 days are from the 2009 YRBS.

#### Perception of Martha's Vineyard High School Use

Parents were also asked, in their opinion, what percentage of all Martha's Vineyard High School students have used substances in the past 30 days. They were given four option ranges. The results are shown in Chart 4. Actual MVHS student alcohol and drug use rates within the past 30 days are from the 2009 YRBS.



Parental Disapproval of Substances

- ➤ 96% (n=148) of parents think it is 'wrong' or 'very wrong' for high school students to drink beer, wine, or hard liquor.
- > 99% (n=151) of parents think it is 'wrong' or 'very wrong' for high school students to smoke cigarettes.
- > 96% (n=147) of parents think it is 'wrong' or 'very wrong' for high school students to smoke marijuana.

#### Perception of Risk of Harm

Parents were asked how much they think Martha's Vineyard High School students risk harming themselves if they use any of the following substances.

# Beliefs About Allowing High School Students to Drink Alcohol at Home

Parents were asked what statement best reflects how they feel about allowing high school students to drink alcohol at home. Parents were allowed to select more than one response. Results are reported in Table 15.

# Knowledge of Youth Task Force

#### Limitations

This survey attempted to target high school parents (grades 9-12) on Martha's Vineyard. A total of 217 parents completed the survey. While this number is impressive, it is important to remember that the findings from this survey may not be representative of Martha's Vineyard high school parents as a whole as it represents 29% of the high school parent population.

The sample included in this report was non-random as parents self-selected to take this online survey. It is unknown why parents may have chosen to take/not take this survey.

### **Summary**

Most Martha's Vineyard parents who completed this survey appear to be a strong protective factor for Martha's Vineyard youth. Most have talked to their children about not using alcohol or other drugs in the past 30 days. Most believe they have an influence over their children's decision whether or not to drink alcohol. Almost all parents are aware of the legal minimum drinking age of 21 and the social host liability law in Massachusetts. Survey respondents thought that marijuana and alcohol were the easiest drugs for youth to access on Martha's Vineyard. When asked where they believe high school students obtain alcohol from, the three greatest access points given were friends 21 or older, children's own parents and friend's parents. Almost all parents said they were unlikely to allow their teen and their teen's friends to drink in their home. Also, almost all parents indicated they have not allowed their child to drink in their home or have provided alcohol to their own child or their child's friends.

There are many misperceptions about other Martha's Vineyard parents' beliefs and behavior. Parents underestimated how often other parents talk to their teenagers about not using alcohol or other drugs and how much influence other parents believe they have over their teenager's use of alcohol. Many parents had misperceptions regarding parents' beliefs about alcohol such as rite of passage and having clear rules about not using alcohol or drugs.

Parents also had misperceptions about their own child's substance use and the percentage of MVHS students who use alcohol, marijuana and prescription drugs. Lastly, most survey respondents have heard of the Youth Task Force, correctly identified the focus of YTF and have seen campaign materials.
